UNMISS “PROTECTION OF CIVILIANS” (PoC) SITES ¹

- As of 3 November, the estimated number of civilians seeking safety in nine Protection of Civilians (PoC) sites located on UNMISS bases is 102,228 including 31,046 in Juba (Tompson and UN House), 17,478 in Malakal, 2,701 in Bor, 49,612 in Bentiu, 447 in Wau, 913 in Melut and 31 in Nasser.

ACTIVITIES IN PROTECTION SITES

Juba, UN House and Tompson sites

- Registration of new arrivals last week showed that about 3,000 IDPs have arrived in the Tompson and UN House POCs over the past two months. The majority originates from Unity and Upper Nile states. Relocation to PoC3 has resumed with approximately 11,000 IDPs relocated so far.

Bor

- Relocation of all IDPs to the new PoC site is complete. Construction work and humanitarian service scale-up in the new PoC continues.

**UNMISS ATTEND CERTIFICATION CEREMONY FOR
SOUTH SUDAN NATIONAL POLICE SERVICE OFFICERS**



The graduation and certification ceremony for the first pilot training for South Sudan National Police Service (SSNPS) on Confidence and Trust Building Policing Strategy (CTBPS) for 38 SSNPS Officers was held on 31st October at the SSNPS Headquarters in Bulluk. The training focused on SOFA, protection of civilians, human rights, international humanitarian law, gender conventions and community policing; coordinated and monitored by UNPOL Coordination Team. The ceremony was graced by UNMISS DSRSG for Political, Raisedon Zenenga, Police Commissioner, Frederick Yiga and UN Diplomatic Police Officers.
